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Maui Forest Bird Recovery Project Fundraiser-"It's for the Birds: A Gala Event"

October 14, 2009- MAKAWAO, HAWAII- On Saturday, November 14, the Maui Forest Bird Recovery Project is hosting its inaugural fundraiser, "It's for the Birds: A Gala Event" at the Hui No'eau Visual Arts Center, in Makawao. The event, which runs from 4-8pm, recognizes Maui's native forest bird species, including the rare Maui Parrotbill. Proceeds will benefit future research and recovery efforts by the bird conservation group. The evening will include a keynote presentation by Jack Jeffrey, one of Hawaii's most well-known conservationists and photographers, presentations by MFBRP and the San Diego Zoological Society's captive breeding program on Maui, and music by Maui's very own talented musicians Halemanu and George Kahumoku. Complimentary pupus, fine wine, and beer will be served, and guests will be invited to bid on a selection of items at the silent auction. Tickets are \$100 per person (a portion is tax-deductible).

Formed in 1997, Maui Forest Bird Recovery Project's mission is to develop and implement techniques that recover Maui's endangered birds and restore their habitat through research, development and application of conservation techniques. MFBRP focuses on the most critically endangered of the surviving Maui honeycreepers. The Project combines habitat management with ornithological research to discover the reasons for the rarity of these birds and the ways in which we can prevent their extinction.

Jack Jeffrey

As a long time resident of the Big Island of Hawaii, wildlife biologist, photographer and birder, Jack Jeffrey, is intimately familiar with Hawaii's hidden valleys, remote rainforests and rare birds. He brings to his images the knowledge from over 30 years of observation and study of Hawaii's endemic birds, as well as those from around the Pacific. He combines a naturalist's curiosity with a photographer's patience and technical skill to produce beautiful images. Jack is a recipient of numerous conservation and photography awards including the prestigious National Ansel Adams Award for Conservation Photography.

Halemanu

Halemanu is among Hawaii's most sought after musicians. He has performed over 4500 live and studio performances throughout Hawaii, Japan, and North America. He is a prodigious vocalist, ukulele player, and guitarist who works as soloist and sideman. In recent years he has been teaching students guitar and musical concepts. He was featured on a segment of the Travel Channel and has also performed for several local and west coast television stations. He has played on several local artist's albums and most recently his debut album, which was released in 2008.

George Kahumoku Jr.
